Arts Integration

Art as Curriculum

If a school has a music, art, or choir teacher, their approach is most likely and primarily Arts as Curriculum. Students develop knowledge and skills in a particular art form. Often referred to as "arts learning" or "art for art's sake," the programs are guided by national, state, or local standards for each of the art forms. For example, in visual arts, students learn the content, processes, and techniques for two- or three-dimensional work. They learn how the visual arts developed and changed throughout history, and engage in creating and analyzing works created in a variety of media.

Arts-Enhanced Curriculum

When the arts are used as a device or strategy to support other curriculum areas, but no objectives in the art form are explicit, then the approach is called Arts-Enhanced Curriculum. For example, students sing the ABCs as a means to other ends—remembering the letters and sequence of the alphabet. However, students are not usually expected to learn about melody, song structure, or develop specific singing skills. Arts-Enhanced Curriculum acts as a "hook" to engage students in learning content. Additionally, teachers need little or no training in the art form. Arts-Enhanced Curriculum is often mistaken for Arts-Integrated Curriculum or a distinction is not made between the two.

Arts-Integrated Curriculum

In Arts-Integrated Curriculum, the arts become the approach to teaching and the vehicle for learning. Students meet dual learning objectives when they engage in the creative process to explore connections between an art form and another subject area to gain greater understanding in both. For example, students meet objectives in theater (characterization, stage composition, action, expression) and in social studies. The experience is mutually reinforcing—creating a dramatization provides an authentic context for students to learn more about the social studies content and as students delve deeper into the social studies content their growing understandings impact their dramatizations. For Arts-Integrated Curriculum to result in deep student understanding in both the art form and the other curriculum area, it requires that teachers engage in professional development to learn about arts standards and how to connect the arts to the curriculum they teach.



School Information

School Uniform/ Dress Code

The MKS community supports the uniform dress code policy. The dress code encourages all elementary and middle school students to dress in white, black, or red tops with black or khaki bottoms on Friday.

The acceptable "tops" for elementary students are:

- Polo-type shirts
- Full cut standard shirts with white collars
- Turtlenecks
- McKinley wear
- All of the above must be red, black, navy, or white
- Tops should not have logos other than a McKinley logo. (plain shirts)

The acceptable "bottoms" for elementary students are:

- Pants, shorts, skirts, or jumpers
- Blue jeans

Please note, students must wear closed-toe shoes (no flip flops or slides).

Middle School students do not have a specific uniform, but must wear clothing that has appropriate coverage and does not exhibit any inappropriate logos or themes. Please note that clothing needs to be an appropriate length and spaghetti straps and halter tops are not allowed. No torn or ripped bottoms.

Back to School Night

This year's Back to School Night is September 15th. This is an evening for parents only and is an opportunity for you to learn about the academic program for the year from your child's teacher, what teacher expectations are.

School Rules and Policies

Attendance- Absence from class, regardless of the reason, limits your child's educational opportunities, and can negatively affect his/ her grades and academic achievement.

Notification of Absences- Excused absences include: illness, quarantine, doctor's appointment, attending a funeral, religious holiday exercises, and others per EC 46014 and 48205. Per EC 48260, EC 48261, & EC.

Rewards- for appropriate behavior may include being recognized as a role model for other students; earning positions of responsibility and leadership; receiving a positive referral or call home.

Consequences for misbehavior may include a verbal warning, loss of special class privileges, a student/parent/teacher conference.

Special Programs

Chromebooks- Students use Chromebooks daily. All Students receive a take-home Chromebooks. Students will use technology to research, write, publish, and present using google docs and slideshows. Students collaborate using google docs and they create their own class quizzes using clever new web interfaces.

English Language Learners- English Learners are assessed using the CELDT annually to measure language acquisition. English Learners are instructed during designated ELD time and language supports using language objectives to support language demands during content area instruction.

Library

The Library is full of rich nonfiction texts to support research and inquiry. There are also wonderful fiction titles to nurture the love of stories. With over 15,000 texts we have an expanded program including the ability to borrow library books from the Pasadena public library. *Current librarian vacancy*.

Special Education

The Pasadena Unified School District provides Special Education Services to children identified as having special needs as young as two years old. The extent of participation in services is dependent on individual needs and may range from weekly speech therapy to sessions to ongoing Resource Specialist Program (RSP) services to placement in a Special Education Classroom. Parents or guardians who feel that their child might need Special Education services

should communicate first to their child's teacher or with school administrators so that a referral can be made.

GATE- 2nd 8th grade students may be designated as GATE learners. They will receive differentiation and extension through a structured, purposeful inquiry that engages students in their own learning.

Homework Policy

Pasadena Unified School District has developed homework policy and guidelines based on evidenced-based research, the purpose of homework is:

- To practice skills or reinforce knowledge that has been learned in the class in order to help students master a specific skill
- To reflect on what was learned in the class
- To be used as a way for students to prepare for future class activities
- To transfer knowledge and extend skills learned in one context or subject area to another situation

Getting Involved

Statutory Councils

SSC- The council is a school governance body that strives to improve student achievement through review and approval of the SPSA, oversight of funding for specially funded accounts, dissemination of information about school events, and planning of current and future programs.

ELAC- Parents participate in the English Learner Advisory Committee to address issues specifically related to English Learners. The committee typically reviews EL data and programs and advises the principal, school staff, and SSC on programs and services for English Learners to assure the needs of ELL students are being met.

Annual Fund-(MKSAF) Annual Fund is an organization designed for the sole purpose of raising money for the elementary and middle schools to offset budget deficits and provide enrichment.

Arts Council- The Arts Council is a co-committee of faculty and parents who work to shape the curriculum and enrichment opportunities related to arts instruction and performances at MKS.

AAPC- is a coalition of collaborative parents, students, school, and communities. The AAPC respects and embraces the diverse cultures of our communities
