1. REQUIRED READING:

- *Nothing But the Truth* by AVI

2. REQUIRED WRITING: Complete a two-page (double-spaced, Times New Roman, size 12, 1” margins) analysis of *Nothing But the Truth*: In the novel Dr. Seymour says to Dr. Doane, “It doesn’t matter if it’s true or not. It’s what people are saying that’s important.” Is this statement accurate? Respond using specific examples from the novel (cite page numbers), as well as one example from your own life experience.

3. VOCABULARY: Typically summer reading includes reviewing the Marshall [AP/Honors Vocabulary List](#). You should study and be familiar with the first 349 terms. **Please create flashcards for the highlighted terms only, as well as the literary terms on the following page.** We will also continue vocabulary instruction during the school year.

Lastly, please complete the following Honors English 1 Confirmation Form to confirm that you and your parents/guardians are aware of the summer commitments for this course. By electronically signing, you agree to do this work and uphold the expectations of an Honors English student. Please note that this form replaces the previous hard copy form passed out by English teachers.
